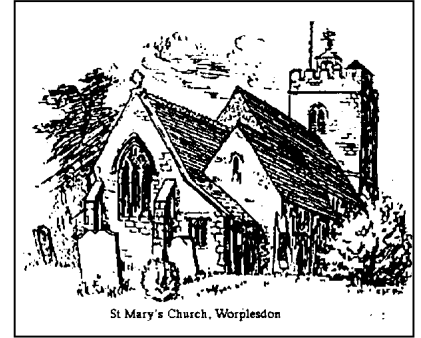

Reflections

Have you seen any of the programmes on television about celebrities who are looking up their family histories – “Who do you think you are?”. Some of them have been quite fascinating and have revealed some unexpected ancestors. One I found very moving was about Stephen Fry who discovered his Jewish ancestors and the fact that they had been sent to concentration camps. He found names of his ancestors and it really brought it home to him the way that people had been treated during the War. He obviously knew, like we all do, from reading history books some of what had gone on during the Second World War but actually seeing names of his ancestors had quite a profound effect on him. It suddenly became very personal.

This is perhaps our problem with war now – it happens to other people in some far off country and most of us are not personally involved although terrorist attacks are bringing it nearer home. But many of us now days have had no direct experience of war. We watch the Service of Remembrance from the Albert Hall and the March Past at the Cenotaph and are grateful for all who have given their lives for our freedom. Although we may not personally know people who have died in, or experienced war, war is still happening. Just recently the Queen opened a new War Memorial for 16,000 men and women who have died since the Second World War.

But it's not just those who were killed. Many live but carry the scars for the rest of their lives – mental and physical. People both in the armed forces and civilians. A mother is in the news at the moment for fighting for more compensation for her severely injured soldier son.

We don't seem to learn or be able to change our ways. If only we could all love our neighbours as ourselves as Jesus taught us.

A group who were particularly affected in the second World War were Jewish children who were hidden away for their protection for months or years at a time. Children, the age of our primary school children, having to learn to keep hidden, to live in dreadful conditions sometimes, or to be given to live with other families for their safety.

And yet many of them survived to make very valuable contributions to society. And it surely behoves us to listen to folk such as them, who really know the effect that war can have on individuals and society. A volunteer at Holocaust Centre said “*I feel that this time it was us : the Jews. But the same kind of genocide can happen anywhere, anytime, to anyone. Until we finally start to put an end to racism, bigotry, and intolerance, I don't see how any one of us will ever be safe.*”

How right he was. Week after week, year after year we are still praying for the people of Darfur, Zimbabwe, Iraq, Afghanistan, Burma.....

Remembrance is right but it is not enough. Let us pray for the peace makers and that one day Remembrance Day will be just that and that God's Kingdom will reign throughout the World.

Our annual All Souls' Service has become an important and moving occasion for all of us who have lost loved ones. This service provides a much valued opportunity to remember our dearly departed and to pray for all who are bereaved. It also provides a quiet space to reflect on the nature of death, acknowledge our own grief and to share our Christian hope.

All whose funerals have been conducted by the parish clergy during the past twelve months will be remembered by name during this service. Please let the clergy have other names you wish to have remembered during this service. Our All Souls Service will end with the lighting of the candles of Hope.

All who wish are welcome to join us for this service when the singing will be led by the Worplesdon Festival Singers. Members of the clergy will be available to speak to people after the service. There will also be an opportunity for any who wish to receive individual prayers and the ministry of the Laying on of Hands.

Holy Days in November

On 4th November we will celebrate All Saints and All Souls. Among the Saints that the Church remembers during the month is Hilda, Abbess of Whitby. Hilda was born in the year 614 of the royal house of Northumbria and was baptized in York at the age of twelve by Paulinus. Encouraged by Aidan of Lindisfarne, she became a Religious at the age of thirty-three. She established monasteries first at Hartlepool, and two years later at Whitby. This house became a great centre of learning and was the meeting place for the important Synod of Whitby in the year 664 at which it was decided to adopt the Roman tradition in preference to Celtic customs. Although herself a Celt in religious formation, Hilda played a crucial role in reconciling others of that tradition to the decision of the Synod. She is also remembered as a great educator, exemplified in her nurturing of Caedmon's gift of vernacular song. She died on 17 November in the year 680.

PCC Jottings

At its meeting on 19th September the PCC heard news of the proposed appointment for St Alban's House. At this stage Andrew was not able to give any details and said that the Clergy Team felt, when announced, this would be a very exciting appointment. The PCC approved the remaining works to be carried out on the house ready for its occupation by the new appointment.

It was reported that work on the re-ordering of the chancel at St Mary's would begin at the end of November and would be carried out to cause the minimum disruption to services. Additional lighting would be installed at St Alban's Hall during October to make it more suitable for supper events. It was hoped that work on clearing the churchyard extension would be completed by Christmas.

The meeting reflected on the Church's response to the outbreak of foot and mouth disease. Comments were invited on how our response to such crisis could be improved and the Witness Group was asked to review this further.

The PCC were given a further explanation of the new service, iWorship, to be introduced for a trial period of six months on the fourth Sunday at St Alban's. The context of the new service was explained with its links to Fresh Expressions as part of a mission shaped church.

The meeting also discussed how parish share is allocated and heard of a new proposal for these decision to be made at deanery level to help parish work closer together and to encourage the sharing of resources across parish boundaries. There would be a deanery meeting in October to discuss these ideas further. The wardens and PCC Treasurer would then report back to the PCC for further discussion.

The next PCC meeting will be on 30th October at St Alban's Church.

Worplesdon Garden Club

Our meeting on Tuesday 9th October was a delightful slide show of shrubs given by Brian Deaville, a frequent and popular speaker at our club.

As we approach the winter, the autumn colours certainly brighten up the garden, especially the acers, cornus, cotinus and robinia etc with their colourful foliage, the berries of pyracanthus, viburnum and berberis and the evergreen shrubs such as rhododendrons, pierus and choisia fill in the spaces when the other leaves have fallen.

Shrubs give us colour texture and foliage throughout the year with particular reference to the fragrance of viburnum, the yellow and pink daphne and the delicate perfume of myrtle in the spring. A little later, the wonderful shape of the cornus kousa with its milky white flowers, the wedding cake bush and the arching flowers of 'the bride', to name but a few, add to the beauty of the season. Brian did stress the importance of pruning to keep the shape of the larger shrubs and his advice was to be quite ruthless with the secateurs when the plant reached the required size for its surroundings!

We have an action packed programme for the next year with a Christmas party, garden visits, a luncheon, quizzes and shows to look forward to. Worplesdon Memorial Hall and Sports Ground

Worplesdon Memorial Hall, the sports complex and the caretaker's cottage are situated on Perry Hill, part of the A322 which runs through the Village.

In 1919 the land was donated to the Parish by Sir James Walker of Worplesdon Place for the purpose of a memorial to those who were lost in the First World War. In 1921 the Memorial Hall was built (funded by an anonymous donor, now known to be Sir Laurence Halsey).

In 1949 the Sime Gallery was added to the building, funded by Mr. Sime's widow, with a collection of her husband's works. The management of the Hall and Sport ground is in the hands of Trustees. Their objective is to maximise the provision of recreational and social facilities, primarily for local residents. The Hall and Grounds are rented out as much as possible and the income is used to maintain and improve the facilities.

The facilities include a main hall with stage. The hall is suitable for badminton, dances, drama and dance classes and large meetings, accommodating up to 120 people. A loop hearing system has recently been installed and there is a well equipped kitchen. A smaller hall and three committee rooms are also available. There is access to the hall and adapted toilets for disabled people.

On the first floor there is a gallery devoted to the work of Sidney Sime, artist, illustrator and caricaturist. Sime owned a cottage in Worplesdon, and spent much of the latter part of his life here. On his death he bequeathed the majority of his work to form the collection now on view. Anyone wishing to view the collection should contact the caretaker.

Outside there are swings and a children's play area and a teenage play area, both leased to, and maintained by the Parish council. The playgroup, who use the hall in the mornings during term time, have an enclosed outdoor area for safe play, and a sensory garden, planted and maintained by the children.

The excellent facilities are enjoyed by the Cricket Club, formed in 1890 and playing there since 1912; the Football Club, playing there since 1921 and the Tennis Club, formed in 1991.

The last two years have seen almost £60,000 spent on improving the Hall and its immediate environment. A new Sports Pavilion, for the use of all three Village clubs, is now under construction and will be completed by the end of the year. The Hall and Grounds will provide a first class facility for village activities for many years to come.
