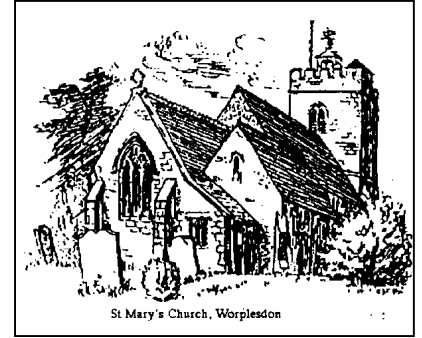

Rectory Reflections

During August it has been so much easier for Wendy to get to work in Guildford. She has even been able to leave home a little later. But now with the start of September and the return of the schools it will be back to the earlier routine and she tries to get ahead of the worst of the Guildford morning traffic. We all have our own routine, our own rhythm of life shaped by the demands of work, the need to get children to school, or just what we think is a good habit. This all important routine shapes when we get up, when we have meals, when we hope to be able to relax at the end of the day and when we go to bed. Many have a different routine Monday to Friday than they have on Saturdays and Sundays. Holidays offer a welcome opportunity to break free of our normal routine, to eat and sleep just when we want to – or at least that is the theory; it does not always seem to work like that!

My own morning routine is shaped around the Radio 4 Today program. I know just whether I am on or behind schedule by what I am doing when I hear the Sports News, the Review of the Papers and Thought for the Day. Some people get quite anxious if their routine gets broken. My father was always particularly lost when meal times were delayed. At work or on holiday, lunch was at 1pm, Afternoon Tea at 4pm and Supper at 6pm.

The sad thing about many of our routines is that they actually leave all too little time for the things we really want to do. Despite all the luxuries and advantages of living where and when we do and the lure of ever more labour saving devices our lives seem to get busier and busier as we try and fit more and more into each day. It is estimated that the average couple spend less than seven minutes each day talking to each other; perhaps it is no wonder that relationships are struggling as we seem to have less and less time for each other. As we try to fit more and more into our lives we also get more and more impatient. We don't expect to wait for our food, meals should be instant, even cheese comes ready grated and vegetables pre-washed. We complain that our computers are taking too long to download information for which we once would have had to travel to the other side of the globe to access and motorists seem most impatient of all, speeding and taking risks to shave a few minutes off a journey that not so long ago would have taken several days to complete.

Aware that all this rushing and busy-ness is not good for us, we are now all being asked to think about our work/life balance, to have more quality time for each other and that all important "me time" and to remember that we "are worth it". There is a real worry that all this talk of work/life balance only ends up making us feel more guilty and feeling a sense of failure as we imagine that somehow everyone else's lives are more in balance than our own. And yet thinking about the balance of our lives is important. Do we really achieve anything by always rushing? Do we need to be so stressed? Can we not manage to spend more time doing the things we really enjoy doing and more time with those that we love. Are our lives really so much better for trying to cram so much into them? And in these whirlwind lives God often seems to be the first victim. We prioritise the things that we believe have to be done. We have to shop or there will be no food in the house. We have to eat otherwise we feel hungry. If we don't get some sleep we will not cope with tomorrow. But if we don't gather for worship, if we don't say our prayers, if we don't read our bibles, life still goes on just as it always did. Besides does the preacher not tell us that God's never stops loving us whatever happens? Once preachers gained loyalty based on the threat of hell fire and eternal damnation. Yet true faith should be based on love not fear. Those who make time for worship, prayer and bible study in the midst of busy lives do so not out of fear but out of love for God. The routine or rhythm of our lives should reflect the priorities of our lives, the things that our important to us – our family, friends, ourselves and our God.

During September and October we are going to be thinking more about the rhythm of our lives and how we can ensure that God is central to that rhythm and not something that only gets fitted in if we have time or worst still gets squeezed out if we don't have time. To live after the example of Jesus, is to let God shape our lives, is to let our lives beat in rhythm to the heart of God.

Holy Days in September

Among the faithful followers of Christ remembered this month is Cyprian, Bishop of Carthage, martyr of the Church who is remembered on 15th September. Born in Carthage in about the year 200, Cyprian was a teacher of rhetoric and a lawyer in the city before his conversion to Christianity. He gave away his pagan library and set his mind to study the sacred Scriptures and the commentaries that were beginning to proliferate. He became a priest and then in the year 248 was elected Bishop of Carthage by the people of the city, together with the assembled priests and other bishops present. He showed compassion to returning apostates, whilst always insisting on the need for unity in the Church. During the persecution of Valerian, the Christian clergy were required to participate in pagan worship; Cyprian refused and was first exiled and then condemned to death, dying on 15th September 258.

The Church of Myanmar (Burma) Association is one of the beneficiaries of the Parish Outward Giving. There has been an Anglican presence in Burma since 1877 when the diocese of Yangou (Rangoon) was founded. It is now an independent province of the Anglican Communion and numbers six dioceses.

In the face of injustice, poverty, oppression, persecution by an illegal military government, the Christians in Burma keep an amazing faith.

The money we wend them goes toward work with children, schools for the deaf and blind, Bible schools, Holy Cross Theological College, the upkeep of churches and the payment of clergy. There is also a separate fund called the Clergy Rice Fund.

You may have read in the papers of a visit to Burma by a cross-party group of MPs and of the shocking stories of the destruction of villages, forced labour and murder of ethnic minorities. Canon Robert Teare, the Chairman of the Association wrote in January this year, "Because of the illness of General Than Shwe, the political situation seems even more fragile, paranoid and dangerous than usual, and writing about what the Church is doing is becoming more difficult." There was an Anglican gathering there last year, but foreign guests (Robert Tear included) were forbidden from attending.

We must remember the people of Burma and the Church there in our prayers. If anyone wishes, please ask me for a photocopy of a daily prayer leaflet which I sometimes use.

Ruth Sayers CMS Mission Partner in Cairo writes.....

I have just completed my first term as a fully-fledged CMS Mission Partner. After nearly three years away, including the time when I was a 'short-termer', I am now on home leave. I arrived back in the UK on 1st May to be welcomed at Heathrow by my parents who were very much looking forward to me being with them for the next few months. I did feel a sense of achievement and despite many challenging opportunities and difficult situations I have made it! The first term completed and now it's time for a break.

Cairo is an amazing place in which to work but it is not without its problems. It is often hot and is always dusty but the people are welcoming and friendly, emphasising that society is built around people rather than things. The language has been a challenge, but every effort to communicate with the locals is appreciated and they are very willing to help you if they can. It has been a good place to start and I hope to use this experience as a springboard for the future.

As you will probably know, I had been working for the Diocese of Egypt under Bishop Mouneer Anis. This was the situation until February this year when he was elected Primate of Jerusalem and the Middle East. The focus of his work and for the diocesan office has grown and is emerging into a new phase and there have already been some staffing changes with more planned in the coming months. Looking back on the past three years I have seen many things change and develop as the church in the diocese continues to grow along with its ministries. It highlights even more the need for resources, particularly staff and clergy. The focus for much of our outreach is medical, social and educational work and it is through these activities, and by showing love and care, that we can reach people with the gospel. Although I have been working in the office rather than directly on the 'front line', I have been able to support the work from my base there and by working for Bishop Mouneer.

During the past few months I have used musical skills, helping at the Cathedral during the Friday and Sunday services, as well as encouraging our small group of musicians. At present, there is a Korean organist, a local pianist, a flautist, several singers, and occasionally an accordion. This has been a privilege, although it is an extra activity, on top of my regular job. The Cathedral also needs clerical help, as it seeks to support various congregations of many nationalities; the Sudanese are particularly prominent in and around the Cathedral compound. A group of people with many needs who carry a strong faith that God will provide for them. The diocese supports them with medical help, and assists with resettlement wherever possible.

Since last December I have also helped to run the diocesan guesthouse. This arose out of an emergency need for temporary help until the new managers arrive. I quickly acquired new skills and was ably assisted by the Sudanese staff and supported by the guesthouse committee. The guesthouse is an important part of the ministry within Cairo. Some guests come on diocesan business, some just for a break, and some as tourists.

Mission partners on home leave have to report back to head office. As you may know, CMS moved to Oxford recently, so I was grateful for my appointments to be in the last few weeks of their time in London. I had my de-brief day and was able to share with the staff some of the events and situations that occurred in the past few months. I very much sensed a team spirit supporting me both overseas and now while on home leave. Along with visiting supporters, I hope to have some kind of further training, either on a personal level, or on a broader basis.

As I reflect on the past months and years, I value your prayers for the future. There are many opportunities, both in Egypt and other parts of the Middle East and I need discernments as to the way ahead for me. My experience in Egypt has been invaluable, and from this place I am able to move forward to whatever God has in store for me.

PCC Jottings

The PCC meeting on 25th September began by remembering Tom Salter, a long standing member of the St Alban's Congregation who had died the previous weekend, and prayer was offered for his wife, Peggy.

Thanks were expressed to Susie More for the new baptismal hanging at St Mary's and for the new lighter weight Green Chasuble for St Mary's. Thanks were also expressed to Jenny Shaw and Jackie Pocock for all their help in making the Festival such a happy and successful event. It was also announced that the June Crossway Extra had generated eight new volunteers wanting to learn more about bell ringing. The PCC also heard that the faculty had now been granted for the re-ordering of the chancel at St Mary's and it is hoped this work will take place during the Autumn. The Chancellor's ruling on the faculty is to be displayed at both churches.

The main item discussed at the meeting was the present staffing levels within the parish and the future use of St Alban's House. Whilst there is disappointment at St Alban's House being empty, it was noted, with gratitude, that the present clergy staffing levels are higher than at any time since 1990. Although it is sad not to have a priest living within Wood Street Village there was general agreement that there were no significant gaps in the running of the parish.

It was noted that the other major difference in the way the parish was currently staffed was that the majority of the staff were non-stipendiary. To replace any of the non-stipendiary staff or to attract a person to St Alban's House would require the offer of a half time stipend and this would add £20,000 to our existing parish share of £62,000. It was agreed the Finance Group would meet to discuss how such an additional sum might be raised including the possibility of a new stewardship campaign. In the meantime whilst further conversations were taking place with the diocese, it was agreed that St Alban's House be let for six months.

The meeting heard reports on the recent meetings of General, Diocesan and Deanery Synods. PCC members were urged to pray for the preparations for the Lambeth Conference due to be held next year. The Anglican Communion is at an important turning point in its history and could face schism. One hope for unity lies in a proposed Covenant which for the first time would seek to define the nature of Anglicanism. Whilst some feel this may hold the Communion together others feel such a document would change the very nature of the Communion. Prayer Cards about the Lambeth Conference are available at both churches.

The PCC will next meet Wednesday 19th September at St Mary's.
